## INTRODUCTION

Dear Readers,

It is with great pleasure that we present to you this fascinating collection of 35 articles, essays and memoirs dedicated to Professor Ewdoksia Papuci-Władyka, one of the most eminent Polish classical archaeologists, long-standing head of the Department of Classical Archaeology at the Institute of Archaeology of the Jagiellonian University and Visiting Professor at the Polish Centre of Mediterranean Archaeology of the University of Warsaw. Professor Papuci-Władyka is widely known and highly respected in the archaeological community, in Poland, and around the world. The presented collection of texts and entries in the *Tabula Gratulatoria* attests to this. During her prolific career Professor Papuci-Władyka has been setting directions and trends in Polish research on classical civilisations by initiating new projects and excavations at important sites such as Koshary in Ukraine, Halasarna on the Greek island of Kos, and Nea Pafos in Cyprus. Working in Cyprus, she has developed a unique project combining the potential of the best Polish universities – the Jagiellonian University and the University of Warsaw – with contributions from other universities, thus creating one of the most active Polish expeditions in the Mediterranean basin. Her efforts in this area culminated in the first archaeological excavation in Greece to be led by Jagiellonian University.

The professor is known for introducing innovative, often pioneering methodologies both in on-site research and off-site analyses. She is an unquestionable authority in Greek pottery, as recognised by her election as President of the International Association for Research on Pottery of the Hellenistic Period. Professor Papuci-Władyka's achievements cover numerous grants and thematically diverse publications, including an excellent monograph on Greek art and a volume in the prestigious *Corpus Vasorum Antiquorum* series (Poland 11, Cracow 1). Her determination

and persistence in pursuing her goals led to the opening of the Polish Archaeological Institute at Athens, and she was also behind the idea of establishing a research station of the Polish Centre of Mediterranean Archaeology of the University of Warsaw in Cyprus. In 2016, Professor Papuci-Władyka initiated the establishment of the Commission for Mediterranean Archaeology of the Polish Academy of Arts and Sciences, of which she became the first president.

Many of the people who have contributed texts to this book or entries to *Tabula Gratulatoria* have known "Doczka" as a student, a colleague, a young scholar at the beginning of her scientific journey, a lecturer, and finally a professor and mentor. It is no different with the editors of this volume. Some of us have known Professor Papuci-Władyka for more than 40 years! The contents of the volume reflect her broad spectrum of scholarly interests. There are not only texts devoted to various aspects of the archaeology of Cyprus, the Black Sea region, and the Mediterranean as a whole, but more personal recollections as well. While pottery is the dominant theme, there are also articles on ancient urbanism, architecture, methodology, and numismatics, and those from a historical perspective, analysing written sources or iconographic issues. We firmly believe that this volume will be both a source of pleasure for Professor Ewdoksia Papuci-Władyka and a testimony to the wide recognition of her achievements.

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## “DOCZKA”



Ewdoksia Papuci-Władyka was born in 1953 in Krościenko in the Bieszczady Mountains, Poland's south-eastern borderlands. She is the daughter of Greek immigrants, Machi (née Gantzópoulou) and Tanasis Papucis, for whom Poland became their second home in the difficult post-war years, not out of choice but out of necessity. She moved from Bieszczady to Bielsko-Biała, and then to Kraków, where she completed her studies in archaeology, with a specialisation in Mediterranean archaeology. Under the auspices of Prof. Maria Ludwika Bernhard, she trained in an almost pioneering specialisation – ceramology. At the Institute of Archaeology of the Jagiellonian University, she climbed the ranks of her scientific career. And it was a path of impressive achievements – 1975; best among students at the Faculty of Philosophy and History of the Jagiellonian University, 1977; the defence of her master's thesis ahead of schedule and with distinction. This period was important not only for scientific reasons. It was then that she met her husband Marek, an archaeologist. It was also then, and this is still applicable, that the colleagues began to call Ewdoksia “Doczka”. She became known to her friends by this nickname, which was perhaps a diminutive of her first name. Her group of peers is not only numerous but it also testifies to her open-mindedness. She easily communicates with all sorts of people: workers, clerks,

professors or even presidents. She finds the right disposition for everyone and gives everyone her full attention without judging anyone by their position, origin or other factors.

Doczka is a scientist who embodies one of the greatest values of science; namely openness to new ideas. As previously mentioned, she began her research by working on ceramics. Most archaeological material used to be neglected by archaeologists, especially if it was not a work of art made by famous artists of Ancient Greece. The professor faced these challenges head-on. During her research, she successfully studied both Hellenistic ceramics; which other scholars had ignored for decades, and vase painting; a field that has been well-established in archaeology almost since its inception. Her thesis on Hellenistic pottery from Polish research at Nea Paphos was pioneering. Doczka has become a world-renowned expert through her work on this material, as evidenced by her appointment as President of the International Association for Research on Pottery of the Hellenistic Period (IARPotHP) from 2015 to 2019. Her work on vase paintings has resulted in an excellent study of the Institute of Archaeology of the Jagiellonian University collection published as part of the *Corpus Vasorum Antiquorum* series. This publication is part of a significant project to study and propagate the collection of Greek vase paintings. The *Corpus*

*Vasorum Antiquorum* series is carried out under the auspices of the international association of National Academies (Union Académique Internationale), founded in 1919. On the Polish side, the project is carried out by the Polish Academy of Arts and Sciences, with which the Professor has been associated since 1996. It was there that she founded the Commission for the Archaeology of Mediterranean Countries in 2016, of which she remains president to this day.

However, research on ceramics was only the beginning of her research career. In 1984, one of the most important events in the Professor's scientific life occurred. Travelling on board a ferry from Greece to Cyprus, she went to Nea Paphos for excavations organised by the Polish Archaeological Mission of the Polish Centre of Mediterranean Archaeology of the University of Warsaw. Thus began her long contribution to Cypriot archaeology, which has been very important for Polish Mediterranean archaeology. It resulted first in the creation of a second archaeological expedition in Nea Paphos under the auspices of the Department of Classical Archaeology at the Jagiellonian University and finally in the merging of these two ventures into one combined expedition of UW and JU in collaboration with the Warsaw University of Technology. These three universities are only part of the institutions involved in the research in Cyprus; our friends from the Wrocław University of Technology, the University of Hamburg, the AGH University of Science and Technology in Kraków, the Academies of Fine Arts in Warsaw and Kraków, and Jan Kochanowski University in Kielce have helped and assisted us.

Over the many years of excavations carried out by the Professor in Paphos, dozens of scientists and hundreds of students and volunteers worked together. It was her work that laid the foundation for the establishment of the permanent Polish Research Centre in Paphos, Cyprus, funded by the University of Warsaw.

The Professor's openness has allowed the creation of an interdisciplinary team which, under her

leadership, remains in the vanguard of the search for new solutions in field research and in the study of archaeological material. All this is happening at a very important archaeological site, the ancient capital of Cyprus, the remains of which feature on the UNESCO Heritage List. The project has been recognised for more than a decade by the National Science Centre, which awarded several grants for research in Cyprus, including a very prestigious one – the Maestro grant in 2015–2019.

Cyprus is just one direction of the Professor's scientific ambitions. For more than a decade, she has directed work on Greek settlements on the Black Sea. Ten years of work at the Koshary site near Odesa and a further two seasons at Akra on the Black Sea have built a strong position for Kraków's archaeology in the area. We remain hopeful that we will be able to return there again.

For years, she supported the idea of the creation of the Polish Archaeological Institute in Athens. In 2021, it was successfully opened, and the Professor became its vice-director. Recently, she started a new archaeological project in ancient Thelpousa in the Peloponnese, in collaboration with German and Greek scholars. Alongside her scientific work, Doczka also devoted herself with equal dedication to her work as an academic. She promoted 12 PhDs, most of whom are successfully continuing their research work, and more than 100 Master's degrees in archaeology. She has always remained open and helpful to her students, whether at a doctoral, master's or undergraduate level.

She has received numerous awards for her work, both at university level and beyond. She received the most prestigious award bestowed by her Alma Mater – the Jagiellonian Laurel. The crowning achievement of her work was receiving the Commander's Cross of the Order of Polonia Restituta by the President of the Republic of Poland for her outstanding contribution to the development of Polish-Cypriot scientific cooperation in the field of archaeology and for creating a positive image of Poland.

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# THE ROLE OF PROFESSOR EWDOKSIA PAPUCI-WŁADYKA IN THE ESTABLISHMENT AND OPERATIONS OF THE POLISH ARCHAEOLOGICAL INSTITUTE AT ATHENS



## Abstract

*This essay presents the contribution of Professor Ewdoksia Papuci-Władyka to the creation of the Polish Archaeological Institute at Athens, of which she is the vice-director. The first attempts to establish the institute can be traced back to the 1990s. Still, it was only at the beginning of this century (2008–2021), i.e. when Professor Papuci-Władyka became involved, that these efforts found a positive conclusion. The Institute has been operating from its seat in Athens since 2021. This paper focuses on the key stages in its establishment, in which the Professor took an active and creative part. Each of these stages required from the organisers, including Professor Papuci-Władyka, a degree of expertise far beyond that of a standard professor of archaeology. But as the now functioning institute demonstrates, all these problems were successfully overcome. Undoubtedly, without Ewdoksia Papuci-Władyka and her numerous talents, the institution would not have come into being.*

Professor Ewdoksia Papuci-Władyka is a person of tireless energy and has been involved in a wide range of scientific and organisational projects. One of them was the establishment of the Polish Archaeological Institute at Athens (PAIA), which she had been dreaming of since the early days of her career. In this short essay, we will outline the role she played in one of the most spectacular organisational achievements of Polish archaeology in recent years. Right from the outset, we would like to emphasise that this essay is not meant to chronicle the establishment of the Institute. It is simply our tribute to the Professor for her contribution to it.

Among the authors of this paper, it is the first author who has known Professor E. Papuci-Władyka the longest. However, this acquaintance could have lasted even longer, as both have been active in Polish archaeology since the 1980s. Initially, their interests, and thus the academic circles in which they moved, were very distant. Professor Papuci-Władyka worked in Kraków and among Mediterranean archaeologists, while Professor Janusz Czebreszuk was active in Poznań and among prehistoric archaeologists, although over time (after 2000), his research interests gradually but firmly extended towards the south, especially Greece. What brought them both togeth-

er was the PAIA, or more specifically, the lack of it, which was becoming an increasingly acute barrier to the development of their scientific careers.

The idea of establishing the PAIA has a long history, dating back to the first half of the 1990s (Czebreszuk 2023a, 2). An attempt to set up the Institute at that time failed, and the project was in hibernation for about ten years. That was when Professor Papuci-Władyka stepped into action. She spearheaded renewed attempts at establishing the PAIA. She galvanised those involved in the first attempt at this task (Professor Krzysztof Nowicki and Professor Kazimierz Lewartowski) and rallied new people representing the leading academic institutions in our country, namely: Adam Mickiewicz University in Poznań/AMU (Professor Czebreszuk), Polish Academy of Arts and Sciences in Kraków (PAAS), Nicolaus Copernicus University in Toruń/NCU (Professor Mariusz Mielczarek), University of Gdańsk/UG (Professor Nicholas Sekunda) and University of Wrocław/UWr (Professor Gościwit Malinowski). This was happening between 2007 and 2009.

It was an informal group of several people representing their institutions, a kind of discussion club. Everyone agreed that the Institute must be established, but how to do it was a matter of genuinely academic deliberations at the time. Precedence was courteously given to the ‘veterans’ of the cause, Professors Nowicki and Lewartowski, but it was clear to everyone that it was Professor Papuci-Władyka who, with her energy, determination and common sense, ‘organised’ us as a team. She always strived to break complex issues into concrete tasks and sought practical ways for their accomplishment. Then, a unique sense of understanding was forged between Professor Papuci-Władyka and Professor Czebreszuk, which remains the basis of their cooperation to this day.

The first stage towards the formalisation of the PAIA founding group was the establishment of a consortium. It was created on February 27<sup>th</sup> 2012 and consisted of Jagiellonian University/JU (Professor Papuci-Władyka), AMU (Professor Czebreszuk), NCU (Professor Daniel Makowiecki), University of Warsaw/UW (Professor Lewartowski), Cardinal

Stefan Wyszyński University in Warsaw (Professor Zbigniew Kobyliński) and the PAAS (Professor Papuci-Władyka), along with the Institute of Archaeology and Ethnology of the Polish Academy of Sciences/IAE PAS (Professor Nowicki) in a co-ordinating role. The Consortium declaration, signed by the director, the president, and by rectors of the respective universities, expressed the will of all signatories to work together to establish a Polish institute in Athens. However, the Consortium, as such, had no legal personality.

The time that followed was filled with preparing letters and organising meetings with decision-makers, seeking support, promoting the idea of the institute in the media, and simply taking advantage of every opportunity to achieve this desired goal. A good example of this was the event held on July 8<sup>th</sup> 2013. On the occasion of the visit of the President of the Hellenic Republic to Warsaw, Professors Papuci-Władyka and Czebreszuk were invited to an official dinner. There, they had a chance to meet with many people, including the Minister of Culture and National Heritage, Mr Bogdan Zdrojewski, who supported the idea of establishing the PAIA and was our intermediary in contacting Professor Barbara Kudrycka, the then Minister of Science and Higher Education. Unfortunately, Minister Kudrycka showed no interest in contacting the Consortium’s representatives. It was only her successor, Professor Lena Kolarska-Bobińska, who prompted a meeting (January 21<sup>st</sup> 2014) between representatives of the Consortium (Professor Papuci-Władyka, Professor Andrzej Buko, Professor K. Lewartowski, Professor J. Czebreszuk and Dr Bartłomiej Lis) and the Ministry (represented by Secretary of State Professor Marek Ratajczak and Undersecretary of State Professor Daria Lipińska-Nałęcz along with directors of several departments). Minister Ratajczak stressed the crucial importance of defining the legal formula of the Institute, as this would determine its eligibility for funding. This was the first serious and meaningful conversation with decision-makers, but it made us realise the scale of our problems. There were two key issues: raising funds to acquire the In-

stitute's premises in Athens (with the purchase of real estate as the optimal option, although renting was also considered) and defining the organisational structure of the PAIA (among other things, it was considered whether it should be a unit within the IAE PAS, a foreign institute within PAS, or a separate unit with legal personality).

Thanks to the regular communication of Professor Papuci-Władyka and Professor Czebreszuk with the then Polish Ambassador in Athens, Dr Michał Klinger (the Polish MFA was committed to supporting our efforts from the very beginning), an opportunity arose at the turn of 2014 and 2015 to establish the seat of the Institute in the building formerly occupied by the Polish Consulate, which had moved to a new location. The appropriate letter on the issue was sent to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs on December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2014. Unfortunately, such a solution was not approved by the Greek authorities: foreign institutes/schools must be freely accessible to Greek citizens, while the building in question was located on the extraterritorial plot belonging to the embassy.

At the same time, we were securing written endorsements from the President of the PAAS (the credit for which goes to Professor Papuci-Władyka alone), the President of the Polish Academy of Sciences, and the rectors of the respective universities, to name a few. In the search for funds, a letter was sent to the Council of the National Programme for the Development of the Humanities (May 2016) requesting the establishment of a targeted project for the erection of the PAIA.

The year 2016 brought a crisis in the efforts to establish the Institute. The question of the ultimate organisational structure did not move forward; on the contrary, we were increasingly sure that a consortium was not a viable option (no legal personality). Despite strenuous efforts, no source of funding for the start-up phase of the Institute could be found either.

At the beginning of 2017, a breakthrough was made. On February 16<sup>th</sup>, thanks to the support of MP Dr Bartosz Józwiak (an archaeologist by profession), a meeting was arranged with Deputy Prime

Minister Dr Jarosław Gowin, who was then in charge of the Ministry of Science and Higher Education (MSHE). Dr Gowin expressed his understanding of our postulates and promised to organise a meeting with his deputy minister, to whom he referred the matter with a request to find a legally acceptable solution for establishing the Institute. Such a meeting took place on June 21<sup>st</sup> 2017, with the Ministry of Science and Higher Education represented by the Secretary of State Professor Łukasz Szumowski. Szumowski came to the meeting with a clear plan. Firstly, he recommended that the Consortium should be dissolved, which should be followed by choosing the institution within which the Institute would be established, after which this institution should sign an agreement (one with multiple interested partners or multiple bilateral ones) ensuring that all academic entities from our country have equal access to the benefits associated with the existence of the PAIA and bear co-responsibility for its development (including the financial terms). As expected by the Ministry, the final step of this plan would be a letter from the head of the institution designated as the administrator of the PAIA to the Ministry of Science and Higher Education. This letter would need to present justification for its creation and a cost estimate, accurately detailing all expenses related to the establishment of the Institute.

At the Consortium meeting on July 7<sup>th</sup> 2017, it was decided to designate AMU as the institution within whose structures the PAIA was to be established.

And here we come to a key moment in the whole story. In November 2017, the President of the Republic of Poland, Dr Andrzej Duda, was due to make an official, but very short visit to Athens. At that time, Professors Papuci-Władyka and Czebreszuk were working in Thessaloniki on materials acquired as part of the AVAP project (Andreou *et al.* 2021), carried out in northern Greece. For them, it was clear that an opportunity was coming up to advance the Institute's cause with the highest Polish authority and to do it in Athens itself. Thanks to their regular contact with the Embassy, they were aware of the



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
